

- Through the development and promotion of marine highway transportation, the program aims to relieve landside congestion, reduce air emissions, and generate other public benefits by increasing the efficiency of the surface transportation system.
- Two major activities:
 - U.S. Marine Highway Route Designations
 - U.S. Marine Highway Discretionary Grant Awards

- MARAD works with manufacturers, vessel operators, ports, and public and private stakeholders to build economically competitive alternative supply chains that utilize our waterways.
- MARAD does not operate Marine Highway services. Instead, we promote their use, efficiency and public benefits.

Since 2010, the Program has designated <u>31 U.S.</u> <u>Marine Highway</u> <u>Routes</u> and awarded more than <u>\$101.4</u> <u>million</u> in grants for U. S. Marine Highway services to <u>64 projects</u>.

- The primary goal of the program is to improve the safety, efficiency, or reliability of the movement of goods through ports and intermodal connections to ports.
- The programs awards and administers discretionary grants to U.S. coastal seaports, inland river ports, or Great Lakes ports.
- The Secretary may increase the Federal share of costs above 80 percent for: (1) a grant for a project that is located in a rural area; or (2) a grant awarded to a small project at a small port under 46 U.S.C. 54301(b).

The NDAA for FY2023 made significant changes to the USMHP state at 46 U.S.C. 55601, including:

MARA

- <u>Changed the name</u> of "America's Marine Highway Program" to "United States Marine Highway Program".
- Expanded the definition of marine highway transportation to include:
 - bulk, liquid, and loose cargo.
 - include shipments to/from ports in Canada and Mexico.
 - Please note that funds cannot be used outside of the United States.
- Project Designations are no longer required in order to be eligible for USMHP grants.
- Rural projects and Tribal governments can request an increase in the federal share of the project, up to 100 percent.

Eligible Applicants:

- State, a political subdivision of a State, or a local government
- U.S. metropolitan planning organization
- U.S. port authority
- Tribal government
- A U.S. private sector operator of marine highway projects or private sector owners of facilities, including an Alaska Native Corporation, are eligible to apply for a grant, but require an endorsement letter from the current marine highway route sponsor.

Grant funds have been used for:

- Landside equipment including assorted Marine Handling Equipment (MHE)
- Infrastructure including construction and upgrades of landside infrastructure
- <u>Vessels</u> including purchase, lease, construction or modification of documented vessels
- Planning including planning efforts to support the three categories above; excludes market related studies

Background

- The Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2023 (Pub. L. 117-328, December 29, 2022) appropriated \$10,000,000 to the USMHP.
- The Program has unobligated funds from prior years totaling \$2,423,000. Those funds do not expire and can be reissued.
- Of the \$10,000,000 in appropriated funding, all funds were available less \$300,000 for grant administration and oversight as permitted under 49 U.S.C. 109(i).
- Total funding available for the award was \$12,123,000

Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) Published: February 28, 2023

- Application due date: April 28, 2023
- Statutory award date: Sept 26, 2023

- 16 applications were found to be eligible

- 24.8% match overall, funding \$15,947,280 in total project cost


